PERSONAL PROPERTY

Declaration forms will be mailed the last week of September for the 2018 Grand List. If you do **not** receive a personal property declaration but you have property that needs to be declared, please call the Assessor's Office or go to the website at canterburyct.org. All personal property forms are available to download. Remember to return these forms no later than **November 1, 2018** to avoid a 25% penalty.

PA490 APPLICATIONS

Farm, forest, or open space designations are available in the Assessor's Office and on the website. The deadline to file an application is Wednesday, October 31, 2018. The deadline for Certified Forester's Report was October 1. If you have any questions regarding this program, please contact the Assessor's Office.

ADDITIONAL VETERAN'S & LOCAL OPTION VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

These programs are designed to provide property tax exemptions for veterans whose income falls within certain limits. To receive these exemptions, an application must be filed by October 1st for the 2018 Grand List. Proof of income is required. Check with the Assessor's Office for the income limits.

Yikes fall is approaching! Farmers will be hauling equipment and trucks down the roads to harvest corn from the fields. Please give them room to turn and have patience with slow moving equipment. The crops must be brought back to the farm to provide feed for the animals. The corn is put in a trench silo then covered with plastic and ferments to provide a good feed for the cows. This must last until a new crop is ready to harvest again next fall.

STATE ELECTION - November 6, 2018. Offices to be elected are: Governor, Lt. Governor, US Senator, Representative in Congress (2nd District). State Senator (29th District), State Representative (47th District), Secretary of the State, State Treasurer, Comptroller, Attorney General, Judge of Probate (27th District), Registrar of Voters (Canterbury only). If you will be out of town during voting hours (6 am to 8 pm), you can vote via absentee ballot prior to Election Day. Absentee ballots are available starting October 5.

ON-LINE BILL PAYING - You can access the link to on-line bill paying directly from the home page of the Town's web-site: canterburyct.org. This system allows you to look up taxes paid IRS tax returns (look for the green icon to the far right of the billing page), and pay by phone (844-395-2236 – you must know your bill number to do so) or text (sign up via the web-site link).

As part of Lions Clubs International, Canterbury Lions Club has been serving our community since 1972. We are among 1.4 million men and women in over 200 countries and geographic areas who subscribe to the motto, "We Serve". Lions Club global causes focus the efforts of Lions and Leos on five service areas; Vision, Hunger, Environment, Childhood Cancer, and Diabetes, with the goal of tripling our humanitarian impact by serving 200 million people per year by 2021.

Here at home we have provided and installed Outdoor Fitness Equipment at Manship Park. We will be having a dedication ceremony this fall to honor all past Lions, date to be announced. We have partnered with Connecticut Lions Eye Research Program, KidSight, to conduct no cost visions screenings for all Canterbury children at our Elementary schools. Last year CT Lions clubs with the help of 23 WelchAllyn Spot cameras screened 54, 000 children stated wide, identifying 11% of those screened to need further follow up. We can be of service to local families in helping them obtain glasses for their children. We collect eye glasses and hearing aids year-round, with collection containers in the library entranceway and the transfer station.

Our fundraising events, such as our Ham & Bean and Chicken BBQ dinners allow us to give 100% of the net proceeds to our Club initiates such as donations and support to Canterbury Cares Food Bank, Fidelco Guide Dog Foundation, Pin-ups for Warriors, Barton Center for Diabetes education, and Access Agency, just to name a few. MUNICIPAL AGENT FOR THE ELDERLY

Greetings;

As the summer comes to an end I would like to remind everyone heat can still be a problem in the coming weeks, please check on your family and neighbors to be sure that they are keeping cool. And as always anyone is welcome to use the town hall for a cooling station. A reminder that the building is closed on Fridays.

The fiscal year for 2017-2018 ended with a surplus of approximately \$300 for senior activity line item. With the surplus I ordered and have installed a smaller bulletin board now located by my office door that will have information available for seniors and Veterans.

Over the summer Willow Clauson, Veterans Service Officer for the town of Canterbury has established office hours of Wednesday 9-1 pm. in my office to be available for all veterans' affairs

With the fall months approaching and leaves falling and then snow I would like to remind you all of fall prevention strategies. Falls are the most common injuries to our elderly and in most cases can be preventable.

Energy Assistance: My office will be starting accepting applications for the 2018-2019 heating season on September 4, 2018. Please call my office to set up appointment:

Medicare Saving Programs enrollments are always open; if you need assistance paying your Medicare Part B Premiums please contact my office to apply.

Farmers Markets Coupons: Call or stop in my office to pick up you Coupon booklets for 2018. I still have an ample supply of booklets available

Renters Rebate Program: My office is still completing Renters rebate program until September 27th 2018 The Assessor's office is still completing Homeowners and Veterans Benefits. State law provides a reimbursement program for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. Renters' rebates can be up to \$900 for married couples and \$700 for single persons. The renters' rebate amount is based on a graduated income scale and the amount of rent and utility payments (excluding telephone) made in the calendar year prior to the year in which the renter applies. Application may be made at the town social service agency, or the Assessor's Office, depending on the town, between April 1st and October 1st. Recipient or spouse must be 65 years of age or older, or be 50 years of age or older and the surviving spouse of a renter who at the time of the renter's death had qualified and was entitled to tax relief provided such spouse was domiciled with such renter at the time of the renters' death, or 18 years of age or older and eligible to receive Social Security Disability benefits. Must meet a one year state residency requirement. Grants are based upon income requirements.

Flu Clinic- Thursday October 11, 2017, 10:30-12:30 in side conference room off community room. Open to public. Most insurances cover the cost. Look for information on the town web page and flyers.

My scholarly background is in women's history, specifically the suffrage movement, so to have the opportunity to share Prudence Crandall's and Sarah Harris' story is an amazing opportunity for me, and I look forward to engaging the Canterbury community in the multi-layered aspects of this rich and important history.

Friends of the Prudence Crandall Museum

A new chapter in the history of the Prudence Crandall Museum begins by Drew Crandall

This year has been a season of change for the Prudence Crandall Museum. In February, Kazimiera "Kaz" Kozlowski retired after serving as our Curator for 35 years. In July, Mystic resident Joan DiMartino became our new Curator. She has been working in the Connecticut history museum community for over ten years, most recently as Executive Director of the Smith -Harris House in Niantic and Communications and Museum Administrator for the Colchester Historical Society.

In July, I became the first member of the Crandall family to ever serve on the Friends of the Prudence Crandall Museum Board, and was elected President for 2018-2019. To be clear, I am not a direct descendant of Prudence (she never had biological children), but I *am* part of the same Crandall family going back to the Rev. John Crandall. He landed in Boston in 1634 and was one of the founders of Rhode Island and the City of Westerly. Prudence and I share the same genealogy until the 4th generation of Crandall's in the New World, where our branches on the family tree split.

Obviously, the Crandall family considers Prudence to be not only Connecticut's Official Heroine, but also our "family heroine" for her courageous stand in the 1830s. For me, it's an honor to serve as this year's Friends president, and to leverage my Crandall name to help to preserve the legacy of Prudence Crandall and promote the Prudence Crandall Museum.

I encourage and invite you to come to celebrate Prudence's 215th birthday during the 32nd annual Prudence Crandall Day at the Museum on Saturday, September 1 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Joan, our new curator, will be there as well as myself and many enthusiastic Friends of the Museum.

The free event will be held rain or shine, and will include crafts, demonstrations, live music by the Song-A-Day duet, 19th-century children's games on the lawn, a vintage glass sale, and free admission to the Museum. Food will be available for purchase until 3 p.m. by the Canterbury Lions Club, with a gluten-free birthday cake served at 3 p.m. to all at no cost.

New this year, in the spirit of Prudence' commitment to education, the Museum will collect donations of school supplies such as pencils/pens, calculators, notebooks, backpacks, crayons/markers, and rulers to support students in need at local schools. For information, visit our website.

On Saturday, September 22 at 12:30 p.m. at the Museum of Connecticut History, 231 Capitol Avenue in Hartford, the Prudence Crandall Museum will be a sponsor of a special, one-time performance by actors portraying historical figures connected to the Connecticut Freedom Trail. From the Director of Pupil Services, Jeff Ferranti: I am very fortunate to have been appointed Director of Pupil Services this past July.

We will continue with our new computer assessments which measure student growth in reading and mathematics, called MAP Growth. We use the data from this test and other measures to tailor our instruction to meet the specific needs of our students. Our teachers plan often together and so improve the success of all.

We look forward to a Fall full of the sound of children learning, playing, and growing. Thank you to all the volunteers who have helped over the past years! You make this school a better place!

From Baldwin Middle School

The school has been working throughout the summer in preparation for August 28th. Each year, there is a continual focus on making the school operate more smoothly, create programming that supports high school success, and always improving the climate and culture of the school community. As the first day approaches, there are some key components that I would like to highlight for you specifically:

PowerSchool/ PowerLunch Online Program: Each parent has unique access to this system, which is accessible from the school district website. The areas available for parent access this upcoming school year are more advanced than in the past. Teachers will be updating their weeks gradebooks 3 every (approximately) so that parents are more frequently informed of progress. This information will be in addition to the term grades (progress report/ report card), attendance, and lunch account info already accessible. Regarding the lunch account access, parents can see real time the balance and expenditures.

Building Upgrades: During the summer, the school roofing construction project began and is expected to be completed during the first weeks of the school year. This project was a complex and coordinated effort between the town, the schools, and the entire community.

Assessment and Curricular Resource Upgrades: During the spring, students

in Grade 5 through 8 participated in the spring administration of the NWEA (Northwest Evaluation Association) MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) assessment and this test allows the school to determine growth over the course of the school year as related to testing norms and national percentile. The results will be distributed in the near future along with the Spring 2018 Smarter Balanced Assessment score.

Communication and the School Website: The school will continue to utilize the school website where one can find all important forms available, current school and district calendars, and links to ways to communicate with teachers and staff members.

School Policy and Student Handbook: Students will receive a hard copy of the student handbook and it is available on the school website for reference to student behavioral expectations and school policies.

Breakfast and Lunch Menu: The school will continue to post monthly menu offerings on the Food Services page of the school website.

Free & Reduced Lunch Application: The federal application for Free and Reduced-price School Meals or Free Milk is available on the Food Services page on the school website. If you have any questions, please contact the Business Office.

Grade Level Configuration: Based on the importance of allowing for ample time for all content areas and enrollment levels, there are two looping teams of teachers at BMS. There is a team of teachers for Grade 5 and 6; and a team of teachers for Grade 7 and 8. This allows teachers to teach one content area for two years and allow classroom expectations to be known which will allow for smoother yearly transitions.

Whv Canterbury? Student/ Community Involvement Project: During the upcoming year, students will be working together in their advisories to better understand the various components of the town and its' foundational values. There are some aspects of this that will need community input and feedback so if you are interested in meeting with students or speaking to teachers about your experiences and what it has to offer, please contact the school directly.
