



# Anatomy of Mars Helicopter

**5th Grade-**We are looking at why airplanes can not fly to space. Air pressure effects the way we fly. On Mars the atmosphere is thinner, so Jet Propulsion Labs worked with NASA to create the Ingenuity Helicopter in 2020. We tested our own paper helicopters in class.

# Social Studies Grades 5 & 6



Grade 5: Students are continuing to learn about the Revolutionary War. We are now approaching the writing and signing of The Declaration of Independence.



Grade 6: Students are learning about Central America and the island nations of the Caribbean. The western side of Central America is part of "The Ring of Fire", with more than 70 active volcanoes. The lesser antilles of the Caribbean also have 21 active volcanoes.

# GRADE 5 READING AND WRITING

Simple strategies for creating strong readers (part 1)

- 1. Let your child choose what to read.
- 2. Talk about what they are reading, what was their favorite part so far?
- 3. If your child is struggling or bored with a book, let them put it down and maybe pick another.
- 4. Subscribe to a magazine that interests them.

In reading class, students will continue to work in stations focusing on plot, text structure, and theme. In a few weeks, students will take the iready diagnostic test which will measure their progress from September. In writing class, students will finish the poetry unit and will be introduced to opinion writing focusing on the organizational structure of an opinion piece.




# Grade 6 Reading and Writing

Sixth grade writers are embarking on



the study and writing of the literary essay. We are essentially writing about reading. This will lead to comparing and contrasting essays. We will be working on this for the next few weeks. Sixth grade readers are currently tackling the novels of Jerry Spinelli, Lois Lowry, and Margaret Peteron Haddix. Some students are reading <u>Maniac Magee</u>, others are reading <u>Number the Stars</u>, and others are reading <u>Among the Hidden</u>. Each book has different themes and issues. We've discussed myth, legend, and legacy and how they are different. We've discussed the Holocaust and we have discussed the population control in reference to the novels. Students are eager to continue reading. Please encourage your 6th grader reader to read!






Grades 7 & 8 Math


Grade 7

To start the new year, seventh graders have been exploring addition and subtraction of positive and negative numbers using number lines, chip counters, and previous number sense. Using a tool such as a number line gives students an important visual representation of the outcome of integer addition or subtraction. Students also discovered that subtracting is the same as adding the opposite of a number!

**Grade 8** Eighth grade students have begun a study of solving equations using opposite operations. We began with simple one-step equations, and have built up our skills to include using Distributive property, combining like terms, and inverse operations to solve complex multi-step equations! We will continue to work with equations, before moving into Functions next month.



Seventh and 8th grade students have finished the unit on Cell Parts and Functions. Students have looked at Elodea, a leaf of an aquarium plant, to watch chloroplasts tumble along the cell wall (pictured below on the right). They were able to see photosynthesis in action!! Additionally, Students observed cheek cells and onion cells, creating some amazing cell drawings. Students are now understanding how the cell membrane functions through observing bubbles. Ask your student about The Bubble Lab! This month we will be starting out unit on genetics!!



## Grade 7 and 8 Social Studies Mr. Durham

7th Grade: 7th graders are continuing our coverage of the continent of Africa. We have been focusing on precolonial Africa. Students created a climate map of Africa, learned some vocabulary and basic cultural concepts related to Africa, and then created and analyzed a slideshow on different pre colonial cultures. Next we will study the impact of the slave trade and imperialism on Africa.



8th Grade: 8th graders finished our coverage of the US Constitution. We analyzed primary sources on the Federalist Papers, analyzed the Bill of Rights, and did a mock Supreme Court Debate. Students are currently completing a newspaper project on the Constitution and will then move on to the first presidents.



# Spanish - 7 & 8

7th grade- We will continue our unit on school. Our projects on school schedules are due early this month. By mid month we will finish up our unit.

8th grade- We will continue our unit on school and review grammar points as well as verbs and subjects. We will learn about irregular verbs and end our unit by mid to late month.

All students should be consistently reviewing their vocabulary packet every day (as little as 5 min), even on days where we don't have assigned homework.



**Reading / Writing - 8th Grade** 

Reading: In reading, students finished their book clubs and are moving to exploring dystopian literature. Students will be investigating what flaws in society authors are trying to show. Writing: Students are exploring topics that can be argued in order to develop thesis statements and write a research paper.

Seventh graders are doing a great job with their Independent Reading! Every time they finish a class book or an independent reading book, they add a link to our book chain. We are already a quarter of the way around the room. As a group, we are reading Linda Sue Park's novel, A Long Walk to Water, based on a true story about the water crisis in Sudan.

In Writing, students are completing their Independent Information pieces. Far-ranging

and fascinating topics include squirrels, hedgehogs, dogs, hamsters, judo, dance, the inventor of electronic television, soccer controversies, how to build a motocross jump, how to build a tree fort, and how to buy a truck! For the upcoming Publication Celebration, we decided to create a digital document containing all 54 of the pieces.




# 8th grade
